

Merit Cleaners (1779) had what looked like a demolition team gutting its insides when I strolled past, and their business phone has been disconnected. No sign of what will take its place.

The Beauty Center (1821) has a For Lease sign up in the window, but it isn't necessarily going anywhere. It is still in negotiations with the landlord, so for now it's business as usual





Jay's Shoe Repair (1869), where you could get keys made while your boots were getting fixed, is gone, the windows are covered with butcher paper, and nobody answers the phone.


Next door in the shop that used be **Hannah's** (1871), there is still no sign of life.

Allure Hair Studio (1877) has also disappeared.

So three businesses that were in the same building as the Oaks Theatre have closed. Is Touchstone's remodel of the theater in order to build a climbing gym a factor, or are these closures unrelated? We reached out to Touchstone about this but as of going to press, we have not heard back.









Noor & Sons Rug Gallery (1898) at the top of Solano is currently clearing out its inventory in preparation to close at the end of the year. After nine years of selling, repairing, and cleaning rugs, the owner is returning to his homeland of Afghanistan to tend to his aging parents.

On the south side of the street heading back west, I pass the empty space where **Five Star Video** used to be (1882). How many times had I perused those shelves for movies? Apparently not enough...



On a happier note, I saw that Vanessa's Bistro is celebrating its twelfth year of serving Thousand Oaks diners, while The Xocolate Bar has provided the neighborhood with mouth-watering chocolate for a solid decade





Cleaner Energy

The Community Choice Energy Program is about to be implemented in Berkeley! The residential rollout is scheduled to begin on November 1. Just as a reminder, this green program was approved by the Berkeley City Council nearly two years ago. The decision to participate was driven by the opportunity to get cleaner energy at lower costs. Residents should expect about 1.5% rate reduction from current PG&E bills.

Energy to our communities will now be provided by 38% renewable (wind and solar) and 47% carbon free (large hydro power plants). Expect your new bill to present two charges: one to PG&E for delivery of the energy, and the other to East Bay Community Energy for the generation of the energy.

The Spanish-born Peralta family took over this land from the Ohlone at the beginning of the nineteenth century. When the Mexican-American War ended in 1848, California became an American Territory. By the time California became a state in 1850, men returning from the gold rush squatted here. Thousand Oaks was then part of Contra Costa County, but when Alameda County was formed in 1853, its northern boundary was Cerrito Creek. Thousand Oaks became part of Oakland Township, which was what they called the area within Alameda County that was north of the City of Oakland. By 1867, voting precincts changed, causing everything in Alameda County that was north of Oakland's Temescal District to be known as North Temescal, as seen in newspapers of the time.



Berkeley Ordinance No. 5500-N.S., Section 13.40.070



English: It shall be unlawful for any person, including any City employee, to operate any portable machine powered with a gasoline engine used to blow leaves, dirt, and other debris off sidewalks, driveways, lawns, or other surfaces within the City limits.

Spanish: Es ilegal para cualquier persona, incluyendo los empleados de la Ciudad, operar toda máquina portátil equipada con motor de gasolina para hacer volar hojas, tierra y otras basuras de las aceras, las entradas de las casas, las céspedes, o otras superficies dentro de los límites de la Ciudad.



Urn Project Needs New Leaders

We would like to thank the many TONA donors who supported our project. We are thrilled with our success and gratified by the positive response to our attempt to recreate some of the neighborhood's original civic art. The Urn Project has now installed a total of four new urns and restored the one remaining urn at the bottom of Indian Trail on The Alameda.

Phase I urns, installed in 2011, are located at the little triangular park (The Alameda and Yosemite Rd.) and in Stone Face Park. Phase II urns, installed in 2018, are in the median at Arlington Avenue and Thousand Oaks

Boulevard and in Frederick Park (Yosemite Rd. and Arlington Ave.).

To commemorate the new urns, we have printed notecards featuring a painting of the original urn done by Alesia Connelly (architect extraordinaire of our project). These notecards will be available for sale at all TONA meetings.

After 15 years, we are ready to step down and hand over the project to new leadership. The molds for more urns, some start-up funds, and a great deal of personal guidance are readily available to create more civic art. Are you ready to step up?
