





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Hey, Thousand Oaks! We're doing something very different for our next gathering. We're joining forces with the Solano Avenue Association and the Albany and Berkeley historical societies to put on a free Local History Trivia Night.

We're holding it at Sichuan Style restaurant so you can order appetizers and beer and/or wine while you test your knowledge of local history.



That's some serious change! Half of the winnings go to the local charity of the winning team's choice. Teams are 3–5 people (but you can come as an individual and join a team); maximum capacity is 60 people, so come right at 6:30 to sign up!


Rules: Determine a team name. Write your team name on each answer sheet before the beginning of game play. This will ensure that your team is identifiable once sheets are turned into the judges.

Assign a player to record your answers on the answer sheet and to turn it into the judges at the end of each round.

Trivia consists of three rounds, with 15 questions per round.

Correct spelling on the answer sheets is not always required; however, the judges must be able to recognize your answers.

On the Avenue

The first change I noticed while strolling east from Peralta was **Ritual Tattoo** (1563) taking the spot that UPS left behind when it moved one storefront over. It is open for business.


Although French-born chef Alain Delangle tried to keep **La Bedaine** going despite his health issues, the French take-out place had to close. In its place (1585, between Peralta and Tacoma) will spring **voluptas** (with a lower-case "v"), an artisanal bakery, or so promises the sign on the window.

Subway is closing shop on that skinny little corner where Solano meets Tacoma (1615) to make way for **Organic Greens**, which is already in downtown Berkeley and the Elmwood district. Organic Greens will offer breakfast, gourmet salads, paninis, smoothies, fresh juices, and three variations of "flu-shots," which all involve concentrated ginger. They also do catering.

I saw no signs of activity inside 1605, where **William Stout Books** once was; 1779, where **Merit**

Cleaners used to live; or 1821, former home of the **Beauty Center**.

Art Thou Graphics has moved to 1533 Solano. No news as to what will fill its old spot at 1861 down the alley next to the Rosebud.



Still empty are 1869, 1871, and 1877 (formerly **Jay's Shoes**, **Allure Hair Studio**, and **Hannah's**, respectively), which are all in the same building as the former **Oaks Theatre** and future **Touchstone** climbing gym.

And it's been a year since **Solano Jewelers** left 1895, and there is still no tenant there.

Interestingly enough, the south side of Solano Avenue is virtually the same as it was the last time I wrote this column!

Discover Notable Past Neighbors

Did you know that the Berkeley Historical Plaque Project has a number of virtual historical markers called e-Plaques? (<http://berkeleyplaques.org/e-plaques>) One can peruse the listings by category (e.g., architects, music, artists & writers) or click on color-coded spots on the website's map to find what e-plaques are near you. Within Thousand Oaks, there are currently three that honor past residents.



Chana Bloch (1940–2017) was a poet, translator, teacher, and activist who lived on Menlo Place. She got an English degree from UC Berkeley and taught at Mills College for over 30 years. Six books of poetry bear her name, and her work graced the pages of many journals and magazines, including the *New Yorker*. Bloch received many awards, including the Pen Award for Poetry in Translation, a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities, and two Pushcart Prizes.

In her home on The Alameda, early music expert and musician **Laurette Goldberg** (1932–2005) founded MusicSources, a cultural resource center designed to nurture historically informed musical performances. In addition, it housed a museum of early instruments. Dubbed the “Matriarch and Master of Early Music” by music critic Robert Commanday, Goldberg also taught music and founded the Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra.



Another noted musical leader who lived in Thousand Oaks was **Arlene Sagan** (1928–2012), who directed the Berkeley Community Chorus and Orchestra from 1988 to 2011. Sagan considered singing a spiritual experience and was dedicated to the idea that all should be given the chance to sing, whether they were talented or not. The City of Berkeley declared Sagan a cultural icon, “one of those people who embody the aspirations and ideals of Berkeley.” Sagan lived on Santa Clara Avenue.

Neatly print your answers. Use the pencil provided on your table in case you have to erase.

Answer sheets must be turned into the judges table during the time allowed at the end of each round. Changing answers is not allowed once answer sheets have been turned in.

Electronic devices or other resource materials are strictly prohibited for use during Trivia Game play. Teams found to be violating this rule will forfeit the entire round. If you must take a call during the game, please do so outside of the trivia game area.
